Annual Report

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AJIS has continued to grow and develop in 2017.

The traditional measures of journal reputation have also improved this year with the AJIS hindex jumping three points to 35.

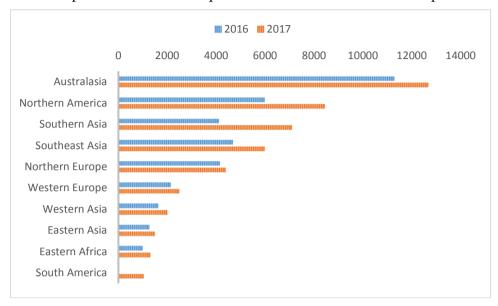


Figure 2: AJIS Regional Readership

AJIS readership continues to improve (Fig 2), and special note must be made of the increasing readership in Southern Asia, up 72.2%, and Northern America, up 41.3%.

In 2017 182 papers were submitted, up 18% on 2016. This continues to place a significant demand on Section Editors and Reviewers, without whom AJIS could not function. Their input, as always is vital, and very much appreciated.

To assist with recruitment of reviewers I presented a workshop at the 2017 Australasian Conference on Information Systems (ACIS) Doctoral Consortium on journal publication, the reviewing process, and the benefits to PhD students, in particular, of participating in this activity. Part of the session involved the students assessing several anonymised submissions as if they were reviewers. As well as getting a better understanding of the process, students got to see papers as they were submitted, rather than as they would appear. The session was very well received, and I have been asked to run it again at the ACIS 2018 DC.
